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
Robotics Club awarded grant

Wildlife Wednesdays

Are you interested in animals, land management, biology or hunting? Learn to identify wildlife found locally in Tennessee and to manage land for wildlife in the 4-H Wildlife Project Group on Wildlife Wednesdays!

Grades 4th-12th have the opportunity to join this group and compete in the 2021 4-H Wildlife Evaluation competition coming up in the spring. Meetings held weekly on Wednesdays at Chester Frost Park in Hixson. First meeting is Wednesday, November 11, 4:00-5:00 p.m.

4-H Public Speaking Contest Everyone is Welcome to Participate!

Grades 4th-12th throughout Hamilton County can participate in the 4-H Public Speaking contest. Even if your 4-H club is not meeting right now due to the pandemic, you can participate. Just create a speech following the guidelines below and send it in by December 15.

If you are not already a 4-H member, join at <u>tiny.utk.edu/HC4H</u>. Winners in each grade level will have the opportunity to compete at the Countywide contest in January.

Guidelines:

- 1. Create a speech with an introduction, body and conclusion. If you are in grades 6th-12th, be sure to include some information on 4-H or your 4-H experience in your speech
- 2. Follow the time limits by grade level:

4th grade—up to 2 minutes

5th grade—up to 3 minutes

6th-8th grade—up to 4 minutes

9th-12th grade—up to 7 minutes

- 3. Practice your speech in front of family and friends
- 4. Create a video of yourself giving your speech (phone videos are fine)
- 5. Send your video to msabin@tennessee.edu. You can use the UT vault for large files—https://vault.utk.edu/ or post your video as an unlisted Youtube video and email a link.

4-H Hippology and Horse Bowl

Hippology is the study of the horse. Can you identify the breeds of horse? Can you identify the parts of a horse? Can you identify the muzzle and the withers? Do you know the difference in breeds between a Palomino and an Arabian? If so, this contest is for you! If not, you will learn about these and other things related to horses.

You do not have to own a horse to compete in these contests. These two contests will be held virtually this year in January 2021. Hippology will contain a series of multiple choice questions, matching and placing classes (watch a couple of videos and rank the 4 horses). Individuals or teams of 3 to 4 youth compete in Hippology.

The 4-H Horse Bowl is a quiz bowl type contest. Youth will have a system to buzz in using a smart phone and a team is made up of 3 to 4 youth. Competition divisions include: Juniors are 4th and 5th graders, Junior High are 6th – 8th graders and Senior High are 9th – 12th graders. If you want to compete, contact Nancy Rucker.







Fall 4-H All Star Conference

Calling all 9th – 12th graders – there is an inperson Fall 4-H All Star Conference scheduled for you! This conference is open to all senior high youth (you do not have to be an All Star to attend). If you are interested in being initiated into the Eastern Region 4-H All Stars, contact Nancy Rucker for an application (due date November 30th).



Hamilton County is part of the SEC multi-county group in the Eastern Region. Each multi-county group will have a meeting. The SEC will meet on Saturday, December 19th at Rhea County Ag Center. The conference will start at 9 a.m. and end at 4 p.m. The conference schedule will include workshops, service projects, initiation and Senior recognition. The cost is \$25 which will include lunch and a gift pack and really cool conference t-shirt.

Registration fee of \$25, payable to University of Tennessee, and t-shirt size is due to the Extension office by Monday, November 30, 2020. A brochure should be out soon. You may begin sending in your payment at this time by mail or deliver it to the office (call before you arrive and let an employee know you are coming to the office to pay your fee; you will receive instructions at that time). 4-H Portfolio

Want to know more about the 4-H Portfolio? Any 4-H youth in 6th – 12th grade may submit a portfolio for competition. Junior high youth compete at the region level. The senior high youth compete on the state level for college scholarships and national trip. The 4-H portfolio is now online. This is a great way to keep track of your 4-H involvement and honors. Set up a virtual meeting with Nancy Rucker to review the process and begin work on your portfolio. Exact due dates should be available in December. Senior high Citizenship and Leadership portfolio due at the end of January, Junior High portfolios due in March/April, Senior High portfolios due late April for Roundup and state competition.







4-H Archery Club Adding Monday Practices

Club members attending Monday practices will learn archery basics and have the opportunity to prepare for the 4-H Jamboree in the spring. Participants will need their own bow, arrows and armguard.
