

74th Tennessee 4-H Congress

Tennessee 4-H Congress was held August 15-18 in Murfreesboro and Nashville. Since its beginning in 1948, Congress has given more than 35,000 4-H'ers and volunteer leaders firsthand experience in state government.

4-H Congress is truly a citizenship experience. In addition to experiencing life in the state capital, youth in senior high learn about civic engagement, including things such as state government, service to others and the election process.

Four Hamilton County 4-H'ers attended Congress this year. Caroline Burns competed in the Public Speaking contest at Congress this year and won 4th place in the state. Desha Wilkins was selected as State 4-H office ambassador. Logan Johnson and Drew Johnson served as senators during the event. Both participated in the Know Your Government portion of the program and participated in hands-on learning about how a bill is passed during the session in the Tennessee Senate chambers. They even had the opportunity to join a Zoom with Tennessee Senator Bo Watson to discuss what they were doing at Congress and his role as a legislator. Desha won the Level 2 Nutrition Health and Fitness project area and received a silver bowl, a one-thousand dollar scholarship and trip to National 4-H Congress to be held in Atlanta, Georgia. During the last evening of Roundup she spoke during the Tennessee 4-H Council installation of officers as she completed her term on the council and was inducted into Vol State, the highest recognition level in Tennessee 4-H.
