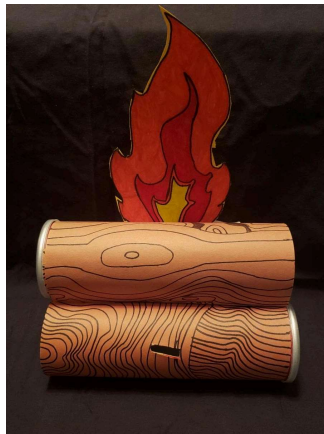

4-H Junior Camp is June 10-14, 2024 at **Clyde Austin 4-H Center** in Greeneville, TN! Grades 4th through 6th as of 1/1/2024 can attend this week of fun and learning.

Activities at camp include swimming in the camp's Olympic-size pool with water slide. Swim lessons are available, and safety is emphasized with a certified life guard on duty every time the pool is open. Other activities - fishing, arts & crafts, special program in robotics and drones, archery, rifle range, muzzleloader and trap shooting (instruction provided), wildlife, nature walks, airbrushing t-shirts, games (including Ga Ga ball, basketball, kickball, and more), tie-dyeing, canoeing, and kayaking. Campers stay in air-conditioned lodges and eat great home-cooked meals in the air-conditioned dining hall. Transportation to camp and back, as well as all meals and lodging, are included in the camp registration fee.

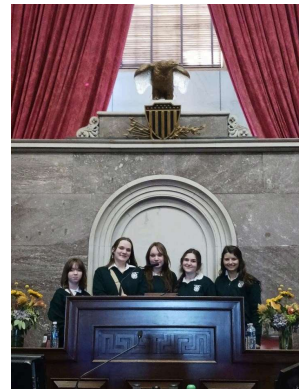

4-H Ignite Conference

Hamilton County 4-H Club members Carolina Shank and John Wood attended the 2024 4-H Ignite Conference in Washington, DC, as part of the Tennessee delegation. They were selected from the Healthy Living Ambassadors. Included is information from Carolina about the conference:

The National 4-H Ignite Conference is a 4-day experience where teens gather from all over the United States (and Puerto Rico) and explore opportunities to connect, create memories, and find their spark by exploring the best 4-H has to offer in STEM, Agri-Science, Healthy Living, Career Readiness and Emotional Well-being.

I attended the 2024 Ignite Conference in Washington DC through the Healthy Living track; prior to the conference, there was a lot of planning and preparation. I virtually met with other Healthy Living Ambassadors selected to represent Tennessee 4-H. During these meetings, we learned Tennessee had the opportunity to present a workshop at the conference. This was an opportunity I could not miss-presenting a workshop at a National Event all while representing 4-H! Needless to say, I jumped at the chance to represent our state in such an impactful way. After many meetings and much deliberation, we

decided to present a workshop on Mental Health: Listening Non-judgmentally.

We flew to D.C. on a Wednesday and over the next four days, my life changed! Meeting 4-H'ers from all over the country and beyond was such an amazing experience and one I will be telling people about for many years to come. I (and the other Tennessee Healthy Living Ambassadors) attended workshops tailored to our interests, met with career professionals with similar goals to our own, heard from amazing speakers- ranging from investment experts, fitness influencers, innovative engineers, and farm musicians, and participated in fun activities like making salsa, creating a YouTube Short, coloring, learning about soil quality, and more. To be in the same room with such amazing leaders was awe-inspiring.

Ignite truly fueled my passion for leadership, public speaking, networking, goal setting, and the power of determination. By the time of our workshop, "Mental Health: Listening Non-judgmentally," we were not only ready to present, but we felt empowered and confident. We spoke to multiple groups about the qualities of a good listener, why listening is so important, and how to incorporate and apply positive and effective techniques into their everyday lives- we fostered discussion through listening exercise prompts and genuine collaboration with one another. All participants left with a smile on their faces, and I left with the knowledge of how to present a topic I care about to a crowd, through visuals, exercises, and discussion and knowing in big and small ways I had contributed to making the best better.

While at the conference, we also saw various monuments, memorials, and museums, including the White House, Lincoln Memorial, Jefferson Memorial, Smithsonian National Museum of Natural History, and the Washington Monument. My favorite place we visited was the National Archives where we saw the original Declaration of Independence, Bill of Rights, Constitution, and Magna Carta.

The 4-H Ignite Conference is amazing and the skills I gained will lead me to the next steps in my journey to be my best. I feel more prepared for the challenges ahead, more connected by the friendships and mentorships offered, and inspired to create sustainable change in my community. The Ignite Conference truly changed my life and this is an opportunity I would have never experienced without the support and personal investment 4-H contributes to all youth. I encourage everyone to explore the many opportunities 4-H offers and take every

step possible to utilize the resources available, with 4-H your best just keeps getting better!

Wildlife Judging Competition is May 10 - Register Now!

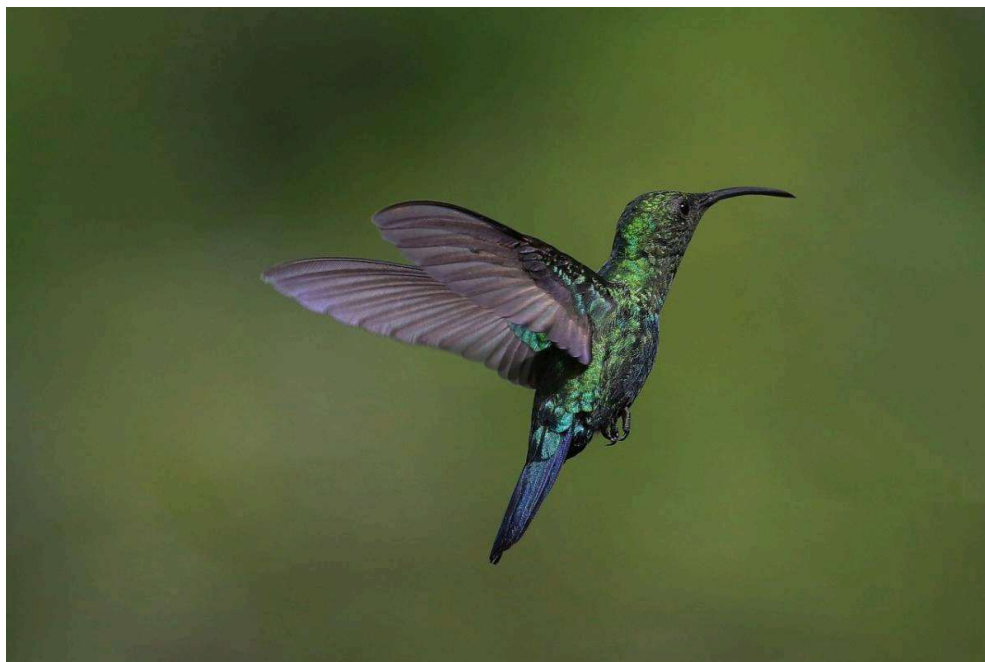
